

SMALL



FLOWERING DOGWOOD

White bracts; partial shade preferred; well-drained, acidic soil required.



PARSLEY HAWTHORN

Fern-like, deeply lobed leaves; white flowers; small red fruits. Attracts pollinators and birds.



SWEETBAY MAGNOLIA

Low-maintenance, fragrant, white flower, adaptable, wildlife value.

MEDIUM



RED MAPLE

Seedless; dense, symmetrical crown; bright red fall color.



YELLOWWOOD

White flowers in spring; bright yellow fall color. Needs full sun.



SILVERBELL

White flowers; needs full sun; good pest resistance.



VIRGINIA PINE

May grow up to 60', grows best in full sun, grows where few plants survive (poor, dry soils, and clay), wildlife value, susceptible to wind damage and diseases.



AMERICAN LINDEN

Fragrant, pollinator, adaptable and tolerant of shade and various soils/pH, sensitive to heat, soil compaction, and salt.



OVERCUP OAK

Rounded crown, deeply lobed leaves, acorns enclosed in the cup.



BLACK TUPELO

Wildlife value, tolerates drought, heat, dry, wet soils, spectacular fall foliage.

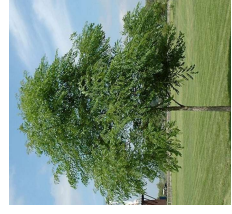

AMERICAN ELM

Vigorous growth when young requires more attention, one of the most Dutch Elm Disease tolerant.



KENTUCKY COFFEETREE

Adaptable to poor and urban soils, salt, heat and drought.



HACKBERRY

Tough, urban-tolerant; corky bark ridges; supports many caterpillar species.



BUR OAK

Very large and spreading majestic tree, needs room to grow; huge acorns with fringed caps. Very drought- and urban-tolerant. Slow-growing but very long-lived.



WILLOW OAK

Soils should be acidic, yellow-to-orange fall color, 1/2" acorns

Please save your trees...



MULCH VOLCANO

Mulch 'volcanoes' piled up against tree trunks are harmful to trees, causing decay of the bark that leads to bigger issues – even the death of your tree.

Make doughnuts, not volcanoes.

The root flare of the tree should be visible.

Mulch should be 3 inches away from the trunk, 3 inches deep, and in a 3-foot ring around the tree. Your trees will thank you!
